



# Green <sup>2</sup> Troops - Daisy Good Neighbor Badge

**Goal:** Learn about your community and discover how to be a kind, helpful, and eco-friendly neighbor—without making waste!

**Girl Scout Mission Connection:** Girl Scouts take action to help their communities. This badge helps Daisies see how they fit into their town, and how small, waste-free choices can make a big difference for the people and places around them.

## Step 1: Map It Out

Badge Step: Discover your neighborhood

Use old paper, an envelope, or a cardboard panel to draw a simple neighborhood map. Include:

- Your house
- One park or natural space
- One place that helps people (library, fire station, food pantry)

## **Girl-Led Prompt:**

What places in your town help make life better for others?

## Step 2: Meet a Helper (Gently!)

**Badge Step:** Meet someone who helps your community

Write or draw a thank-you note to a community helper (teacher, mail carrier, librarian, etc.) using reused materials. Deliver it with your adult—no envelope needed! Just a smile and gratitude.

**Green Tip:** Make your note on the back of an old flyer or card.

### Step 3: Be a Good Neighbor

**Badge Step:** Practice being a good neighbor

#### Choose one:

- Donate gently used toys, books, or clothes
- Pick up litter at a local park
- Make a card or craft from scraps for someone who lives alone
- Ask if an elderly neighbor needs help with anything simple (like watering flowers)

#### Girl-Led Reflection:

What does a "good neighbor" do? How does it make you feel to help?

## **Step 4: Teach and Share**

Badge Step: Tell someone how you helped

Tell your family, troop, or a friend about what you did to be a good neighbor—and how you did it without making waste! Encourage them to try it too.

**Optional:** Create a poster or drawing about your experience on the back of a paper bag or cereal box.

### **Badge Complete When:**

- You learned about helpful places in your community
- You created something with reused materials to thank or support someone
- You helped a neighbor in a small, meaningful way
- You shared what you did—and made someone else smile

## **Optional Bonus Challenge:**

Create a **Good Neighbor Kit** from your toy bin, art box, or bookshelf—fill it with gently used items and donate to a local shelter, family, or center. Use only what you already have!
